



# Theme Overview ~ Kingfishers Class (Year 6)

## Spring Term One 2016

English: Spoken, Reading, Writing, Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPAG)	Mathematics	
<p>This half term, we will be using Marcus Sedgewick's novel 'Floodland' as our core text for English and explore 'Shackleton's Journey' in our whole class reading sessions. As part of reading as a reader, we will develop our ability to make precise inferences about character's actions and emotions. We will also draw comparisons between both books, considering the themes that overlap in the two texts. When writing, we will focus intently on how writers build atmosphere and use characters' reactions to advance the story. As part of this we will focus on using punctuation for effect and varying our sentence structure for impact.</p> <p><b>Spelling:</b> We will revise our understanding of applying different 'shun' suffixes to root words: tion, sion, ssion, cian, and ation, and investigate the rules for spelling words with silent letters. In addition to this, we will explore when to use /ei/ or /ie/ to spell words with the long /ee/ sound. Children will continue to learn to spell key words at the expected level for Year 6 alongside this. In support of this, we encourage the children to think about using three spelling strategies to help them decide on the right spelling; identify the root word; make links to other words you know; use syllables.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>We will learn to:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Revise our understanding of place value in decimal numbers and apply this to developing our skills of comparing, ordering, positioning and rounding decimals.</li> <li>• Add and subtract fractions and mixed numbers with different denominators.</li> <li>• Identify equivalences between fractions, decimals and percentages.</li> <li>• Find fractions and percentages of a number or an amount.</li> <li>• Convert between units of measure (mm, cm and m; m and km; g and kg; ml and l).</li> <li>• Calculate missing angles in triangles and quadrilaterals.</li> <li>• Consolidate our understanding and use of mental and written methods for all four operations: addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.</li> <li>• Apply all of the above skills to reasoning for answers, proving or disproving statements, and problem solving.</li> </ul>
